





Almighty God, to you all hearts are open, all desires known, and from you no secrets are hid: Cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you, and worthily magnify your holy Name; through Christ our Lord. **Amen.** 



Our weekly **liturgy** (i.e., form of worship) follows a pattern that Christians have enacted for centuries gathering in God's house, proclaiming God's deeds in scripture and song, communing with God in prayer, and eventually gathering at the altar/table to be nourished by Christ's Body & Blood. This pattern is how we remember God's love for us. It also allows us to remember ourselves as God's people for the world.

Every service of the Eucharist, or Mass, is divided into two sections: the Liturgy of the Word and the Liturgy of Holy Communion. The first section borrows from Jewish synagogue patterns of readings, teaching & prayer. The second section is a gathering – a literal a "re-membering" – of the Body of Christ around the table of Christ as we celebrate the Last Supper. Jesus instructed us to, "do this in remembrance of me" (Lk 22:19).

The **Collect** is a short prayer that changes every week, yet its function remains the same. This opening petition is meant to *collect* our scattered thoughts and intentions as we communally direct our hearts and minds to God.

Today's First Reading continues the story of Peter and John's miraculous healing of a lame beggar at the Temple gate, followed by their arrest. According to Luke, the arrest is instigated by the Sadducees, who did not believe in a resurrection of the dead. The Pharisees, by contrast, taught a future resurrection for all people at the consummation of time, but Peter and John are proclaiming resurrection *now* as a present and life-giving reality in Jesus.

The rulers, elders, and scribes assembled in Jerusalem, with Annas the high priest, Caiaphas, John, and Alexander, and all who were of the high-priestly family. ## Second Reading

1 John 3:16-24

See what love the Father has given us, that we should be called children of God; and that is what we are. The reason the world does not know us is that it did not know him. Beloved, we are God's children now; what we will be has not yet been revealed. What we do know is this: when he is revealed, we will be like him, for we will see him as he is. And all who have this hope in him purify themselves, just as he is pure.

Everyone who commits sin is guilty of lawlessness; sin is lawlessness. You know that he was revealed to take away sins, and in him there is no sin. No one who abides in him sins; no one who sins has either seen him or known him.

Today's **Psalm** is surely the most familiar and popular of all psalms, celebrating God's loving care for us under the guise of a good shepherd who provides nourishment, security, and protection. God guides us on our journey through life so that we might "dwell in the house of the Lord."

Today's Second Reading highlights the defining mark of Christian life: love. According to John, self-giving love is proof that Christians have passed from death to life. By contrast, our refusal to love one another is tantamount to murder. True love is modeled upon the life of Jesus and manifest in acts of self-sacrifice and generosity. Such deeds reveal our true identity as children of God.

Little children, let no one deceive you. Everyone who does what is right is righteous, just as he is righteous.

## People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Jesus said, "I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep. The hired hand, who is not the shepherd and does not own the sheep, sees the wolf coming and leaves the sheep and runs away—and the wolf snatches them and scatters them. The hired hand runs away because a hired hand does not care for the sheep. I am the good shepherd. I know my own and my own know me, just as the Father knows me and I know the Father.

And I lay down my life for the sheep. I have other sheep that do not belong to this fold. I must bring them also, and they will listen to my voice. So there will be one flock, one shepherd. For this reason the Father loves me, because I lay down my life in order to take it up again. No one takes it from me, but I lay it down of my own accord. I have power to lay it down, and I have power to take it up again. I have received this command from my Father."

#### The Nicene Creed

Please stand

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen. We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit, he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures;

Today's **Gospel**Reading develops the image of a shepherd.
In Hebrew scripture,
God is called the
Shepherd of Israel, as well royal and messianic figures who lead and rescue God's people.

Jesus describes himself as the "good" - or model shepherd. Jesus is a model both because of his willingness to lay down his life and also because of his intimate knowledge of his flock. The intimacy between a shepherd and his flock mirrors that between the Father and the Son. Such intimacy is meant to bring all of Jesus' followers into union with him and with one another.

This ancient confession of the universal Church unites us as one Body across time & space. The Creed provides an apostolic lens, or perspective, for understanding scripture. It also articulates foundational beliefs about the Triune God of Christian Faith. It is both a safeguard & inspiration, providing a shared foundation for our individual spiritual journeys.

Each week we **pray** for the Church, the world, the suffering & the dead. We pray for those who are closest to us, as well as those who are furthest away, being reminded in prayer that our family in Christ includes strangers whom we may never meet. The specific language & global perspective are offered to shape & inform our individual prayers throughout the week.

he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end. 




### The Presentation of Eucharistic Elements

Having heard the Scriptures proclaimed (Readings) and having responded in faith (Creed), having prayed our intentions, we now exchange the language of reconciliation in Christ (2 Cor. 5:16-21), the language of heaven: *shalom*, or **peace**.

## *Q. What are the sacraments?*


A. The sacraments are outward and visible signs of inward and spiritual grace, given by Christ as sure and certain means by which we receive that grace.

## Q. What is the Holy Eucharist?

A. The Holy Eucharist is the sacrament commanded by Christ for the continual remembrance of his life, death, and resurrection, until his coming again. (BCP, 859)

## The Great Thanksgiving: Eucharistic Prayer D BCP 372

The prayer begins with the opening dialogue, the **sursum corda** ("Lift up your hearts...").



It is truly right to glorify you, Father, and to give you thanks; for you alone are God, living and true, dwelling in light inaccessible from before time and for ever. *The Celebrant continues*.

Joining with them, and giving voice to every creature under heaven, we acclaim you, and glorify your Name, as we sing:



This proclamation includes two songs of praise. "Holy, Holy, Holy" is the song of angels surrounding God's throne (Rev. 4:8). "Hosanna!" is the song of pilgrims who welcomed Jesus to Jerusalem on Palm Sunday (Matt. 21:9). We join with both the angels of heaven and all those looking for God's deliverance in our world.



The Celebrant continues with a remembrance of salvation history and Jesus' Words of Institution at the Last Supper until ... we praise you and we bless you.

We praise you, we bless you, We give thanks to you, And we pray to you, Lord our God.

The Celebrant continues with prayers, summoning the Holy Spirit, until:

Celebrant Through Christ, and with Christ, and in Christ, all honor and glory are yours, Almighty God and Father, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, for ever and ever. Amen.


### The Lord's Prayer


In the **fraction**, or breaking of bread, the Passion of Christ is "publicly exhibited" before our eyes (Gal. 3:1).

At the **altar** we offer ourselves to God. allowing ourselves to be broken & shared. like bread and wine, for the world. Finally, we receive the bread & wine - the Body & Blood of Christ - our spiritual food & drink, which unites us to Christ and his risen life.

Q. What are the benefits which we receive in the Lord's Supper?

A. The benefits we receive are the forgiveness of our sins, the strengthening of our union with Christ and one another, and the foretaste of the heavenly banquet which is our nourishment in eternal life. (BCP, 859-60)


